NOTES FROM THE LOFT

The Gospels and Carols of the Christmas season prominently feature Our Blessed Lady, the devoted St. Joseph, and the Divine Child. However, there are other characters – and none too savory! Sts. Matthew and Luke mention them as being the recipients of angelic salutations or observers of celestial signs. We sing of them in ANGELS, WE HAVE HEARD ON HIGH, SILENT NIGHT, THE FIRST NOWELL, DO YOU HEAR WHAT I HEAR? and WE THREE KINGS. They are the Shepherds and the Magi.

In his recording, "Prepare the Way of the King" (Lighthouse Catholic Media), scripture scholar and convert to Catholicism, Dr. Scott Hahn shares the fruit of his research on these familiar persons. He recounts that most of us think of shepherds as "gentle, humble country boys", following in the footsteps of greater shepherds before them: Abel, Moses, and David. Hardly, the case! In the time of Jesus, shepherds were considered "deceitful scoundrels" and "thieves"! So untrustworthy was their reputation that they couldn't give testimony in court because they were generally assumed to be "untrustworthy" "liars"! And if accused of a crime, they were had to prove their innocence!

The Magi fare just as badly. Dr. Hahn reminds us the Scriptures do not name or number them, nor call them kings. They were "magicians", practitioners of the black arts. They lived in a world of omens and portents and superstitious searching. Rabbis called 'accursed' anyone who consulted with them, and in the book of Acts, we read how Simon Magus tried to buy the apostolic powers of St. Peter, forever lending his name to the sin we call 'simony'. Yet God was at work in the Magi's hearts, for when they found the Holy Child, (and thwarted Herod's evil designs), they humbly laid the tools of their trade at His tiny feet: myrrh (used to make the ink for writing spells and incantations), and their gold and frankincense (sprinkled like glitter over their mysterious writings).

Christ did not announce His arrival to Herod or High Priest, but to sinners and sorcerers! Right from the start! Jesus, the GOOD Shepherd, comes for all no matter what we have done or what others think of us! JOY TO THE WORLD!

Life: An "Epiphany" of God "Life is always a good. ...

Why is life a good? This question is found everywhere in the Bible, and from the very first pages it receives a powerful and amazing answer. The life which God gives man is quite different from the life of all other living creatures, inasmuch as man, although formed from the dust of the earth (cf. Gen 2:7, 3:19; Job 34:15; Ps 103:14; 104:29), is a manifestation of God in the world, a sign of his presence, a trace of his glory (cf. Gen 1:26-27; Ps 8:6). This is what Saint Irenaeus of Lyons wanted to emphasize in his celebrated definition: 'Man, living man, is the glory of God'. Man has been given a sublime dignity, based on the intimate bond which unites him to his Creator: in man there shines forth a reflection of God himself" (The Gospel of Life, n. 34). **The next Respect Life Holy Hour will be on Thursday, January 22, 2015 at 7:00 PM**

WEEK OF PRAYER FOR CHRISTIAN UNITY

Assumption Church is proud to sponsor this year's Ecumenical prayer service for Christian Unity on January 25, 2015 at 3:00 PM. Christian congregations around the world will come together again the week of January 18-25, 2015, to pray for unity. The Franciscan Friars of the Atonement at Graymoor have planned a week-long schedule of interfaith events in Garrison and Peekskill this year to mark this ecumenical effort for healing of divisions, and they invite Hudson Valley residents to participate with them. Father James Loughran, SA, Franciscan Friar of the Atonement, will preside and speak. The theme for 2015, Jesus said to her, "Give me a drink." (John 4:7), is based on the encounter between Jesus and the Samaritan woman.

From January 18-25, 1908, Fr. Paul Wattson, SA, and Mother Lurana White, SA, co-founders of the Society of the Atonement at Graymoor in Garrison, NY, celebrated the first Church Unity Octave, an eight-day period of prayers and seminars focusing on the cause of Christian unity. They wrote letters and articles encouraging others to pray with them "that all may be one ... that the world may believe" (John 17:21). In the late 1960s, the Octave was joined with other prayer movements to form what is now observed worldwide as the Week of Prayer for Christian Unity. On November 11, 2014, the U.S. Conference of Catholic Bishops endorsed the cause for canonization of Father Paul Wattson, SA, Servant of God, and Apostle of Christian Unity and Charity.
