NOTES FROM THE LOFT

Twenty-Fifth Sunday in Ordinary Time September 18, 2016

"I am the salvation of the people, says the Lord" in the Entrance Antiphon for the Twenty-Fifth Sunday in Ordinary Time. "Should they cry to me in any distress, I will hear them..."

The upcoming Readings present us with a theme not unrelated to this Year of Mercy – Justice. The Catechism defines justice as "the moral virtue that consists in the constant and firm will to give their due to God and neighbor. Justice toward God is called the 'virtue of religion'." (#1807)

Amos, who delivers the admonition in the First Reading, was a mere shepherd before God called him to prophesy to the kingdom of Israel. Its leaders – civil and religious – were swollen with power and pride, while the people had fallen into idolatry, greed, self-indulgence, cruelty toward the poor and the pursuit of luxury at their expense. The performance of the duties of religion was reduced to lip service. Jesus, too, will warn us, "You cannot serve both God and mammon." (Luke 16:13)

Amos' prophecy contains an unusual phrase: "The Lord has sworn by the pride of Jacob." (Amos 8:7) What was the "pride of Jacob"? Nothing less than Israel's faith in the one, true God! God, therefore, swears by Himself that the gross sins of the people will be punished.

Just so, in 722 BC the northern kingdom of Israel was destroyed by the Assyrians.

St. Paul instructs Timothy, the bishop of Ephesus, "I ask that prayers... be offered for everyone, for kings and for all in authority, that we may lead a quiet and tranquil life... [for] God... wills everyone to be saved and to come to knowledge of the truth." (I Timothy 2:1-4) How relevant to our own times!

Father Frederick Faber, CO, wrote FAITH OF OUR FATHERS in 1848 in honor of the English martyrs. Unfortunately, his original text has been altered. The original reads, "Faith of our Fathers! Mary's prayers/ Shall win our country back to thee/ And through the truth that comes from God/ England shall then indeed be free."

Choir will sing this well-known hymn – with the Marian lyric – on September 18.

An unjust choice would be to choose to terminate the life of another human being. This is not just a choice, and it is not a just choice — it is an unjust choice. Furthermore, it is an unjust choice which is diametrically opposed to the clear and consistent teaching of the Catholic Church as well as to the clear and consistent teaching of God Himself in the Ten Commandments. The direct, intentional taking of the life of an innocent human being is inhumane and unjust. It is not just a choice!"
