NOTES FROM THE LOFT

The Customs and Chants of Passiontide
April 2017

The Fifth Sunday of Lent ushers in the most solemn period in the Liturgical Year – Passiontide, which comes to a climax on Good Friday.

In good liturgy, this solemnity is perceived immediately by the senses: Music is muted and increasingly somber; purple proliferates in the sanctuary; palms replace the rose petals which made a cameo appearance last week on Laetare Sunday.

For the next two weeks, Holy Mother Church will employ her best pedagogy in training souls in the school of holiness: the ancient traditions of Sacred Liturgy.

Why do we cover statues and images in purple? This practice originated in Ninth Century Germany with the hanging of a large, symbolic purple veil – the “*Hungertuch*” (hunger cloth) – signaling the beginning of Lent to a largely illiterate congregation. This dramatic teaching device completely hid the altar from the sight of the people. It would be removed during the reading of the Passion during Holy Week, specifically at the words “*the veil of the Temple was rent in two.*”

In modern times, veiling is optional but, when practiced, the Crucifix veiled on the Fifth Sunday of Lent would be uncovered on Good Friday – a revelation, as it were, of the means of our salvation. Other sacred images hidden from sight so as to help us focus solely on the Death and Resurrection of Jesus would be unveiled during the singing of the “Gloria” during the Easter Vigil Mass.

The chants of Passiontide include VEXILLA REGIS PRODEUNT (“The Standards of the King”), composed for Evening Prayer for the Fifth Sunday of Lent by the Sixth Century Bishop Venantius Fortunatus, last of the Roman poets. It celebrates the dignity of the tree chosen to be the wood of the Cross, “*adorned with the purple of the King’s Blood... worthy to bear Limbs so sacred... on which hung the ransom of the world.*”

PUERI HEBRAEORUM (“The Children of the Hebrews”) opens the liturgy of Palm Sunday. The text is taken from the Gospel of John (12:1, 12-13). The chant dates back to a “canon” written by Saint John Damascene (b. 676 AD), Eastern Father of the Church and “prince of Greek hymnodists.”

Michael Ward’s contemporary version of the ancient chant CHRISTUS VINCIT! CHRISTUS REGNAT! CHRISTUS IMPERAT! (“Christ Conquers! Christ Reigns! Christ Commands!”) celebrates Jesus’ triumphal entry into Jerusalem. It will be sung at the Choir Mass on Palm Sunday.

RENEW + REBUILD UPDATE

Our original goal of \$1,115,500 in the Renew + Rebuild capital campaign was surpassed a few months ago but, thanks to the generosity of our wonderful parishioners, donations continue to be made. BEHIND THE SCENES AT ASSUMPTION

It takes many people to see to it that a parish runs smoothly. In our continuing series highlighting parish employees and volunteers, we focus this week on Dunbar John, the main Sacristant at Assumption.



"My name is Dunbar John. I'm from the Caribbean island of Grenada and grew up with six sisters and five brothers. Everyone had to be in bed by 9 pm so as to rise early to start morning prayers in our living room – at 4 am. Then we went to morning Mass and, only after that, on to school.

After graduating from Catholic school and attending secretarial school, I was hired as secretary to the judges of the West Indies Associated States Supreme Court in the capital (St. George's), the highest appeals court in the West Indies, when I was just 15.

I was elated with joy and couldn't wait to get back home to tell my mom the good news but, after spending money on wardrobe items for my new position, I had nothing left to pay for the bus.

So I started walking the 75 miles, getting more and more worried; the only thing I could do was pray. Prayer was so engrained in us. Then a car pulled up, and a member from my village called out "Want a ride?" A miracle!

I moved to the city because the distance from my village was too far to travel every day. The city people, though, made fun of me, calling me "country bookie come to town." But I stayed serious and focused.

When I was 19, I emigrated to the United States. I studied accounting, but it was difficult finding work without much experience. So I joined the Army and became a male nurse. I served stateside and in Vietnam, where I fell from a helicopter, injuring two vertebrae in my neck. Upon discharge from the Army, I attended several more colleges, graduating as a registered nurse.

I worked at Westchester Medical Center for 22 years; I also studied labor relations and served as union president at the Medical Center for five years.

Along the way, I married and became the father of two girls – one now a lawyer, the other a social worker.

Through all my years of working, though, I felt something was missing. My religion. So I attended Mass daily at Assumption. Then, seven years ago, I was asked to be a sacristant.

That was the best day! I enjoy immensely every moment of what I can do for the Church."

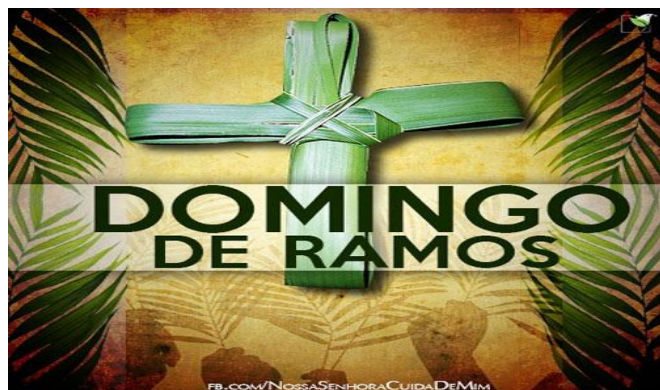

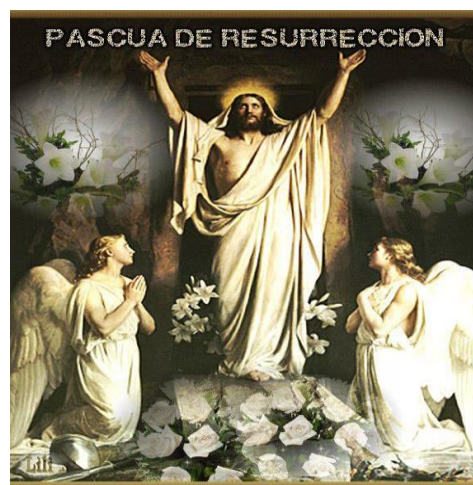
